Hello from Prekindergarten 3!

The weather has been cold outside, but it has not hindered our exploration of the winter season. In science we have been discussing the weather and the temperature at which water freezes. We conducted an experiment to find out if the temperature outside was below 32 degrees by placing a Ziploc bag of water outdoors. To our amazement, our liquid water turned into a solid! We then extended the experiment by bringing the ice-filled bag indoors.

Through observation we discovered that when the temperature rises above 32 degrees, the ice reverts back to water. Simple science experiments are exciting to set up and observe. Questions like: "How can we...?" and "What do you think will happen if...?" get some interesting, creative responses and open up fascinating discussions.

Each week we look forward to Tuesday morning visits from our music teacher, Miss Rachel. When she arrives with her pull cart it is filled to the brim with everyone's favorite musical instrument. Her creative ideas inspired us to imagine ourselves skating and singing in a winter wonderland during our last class.

Tuesdays are very busy days for Prekindergarten since we also have art class with Miss Barbara that day as well. She has shown us how to make plaid paper using watercolors, do crayon resist drawings, and by the end of the month we will have some great bead sculptures displayed in our room.

Spanish class happens on Wednesday when Senora Giberti comes in to visit us. We are learning our basic colors and how to count to five in Spanish. We follow Senora Giberti around the room as we get on board 'the number train' singing our Spanish numbers.

We wrap up our very busy week on Friday with Mrs. LaRochelle's third grade class and our Reading Buddies. We just finished a joint project decorating mittens for an "Oh Dear Winter is Here" bulletin board. The third graders can't wait to visit and everyone looks forward to joining their reading buddies in our classroom.

We love company!





4TH GRADE

Starting this month the fourth grade began a five-month study of the New Hampshire watershed and will raise Eastern Brook Trout. "Trout in the Classroom" is an environmental education program in which the students raise trout from eggs to fry. Within this unit the students learn about the natural habitat of the Eastern Brook Trout, how to maintain a healthy watershed, and become responsible stewards of their local water resources.

While raising the fish the fourth graders are responsible for monitoring the water quality of the tank, developing an artificial habitat within the tank, and tracking the development of the fish. Through weekly journaling, the students observe the life cycle of the trout from the eye egg stage to the fry stage. At the fry stage the trout begin to swim up to the surface looking for food. In the study of clean water and fish life cycle, they will be learning with hands on opportunities of following the Merrimack River in temperature and water quality for a May release.

The students went to visit Randy Smith, director of the New Hampton Fish Hatchery,

to introduce "Trout in the Classroom." Randy explained the importance of the fish hatchery and how it is more than just a fish farm. The class had an opportunity to witness how the hatchery is a controlled environment and a safe habitat for trout breeding. On the tour of the facility the students saw the process of milking eggs from a female and fertilization. Within the hatchery there are different stations that house the eggs from time of spawning to release into lakes, rivers, and streams. While at the hatchery the fourth graders witnessed a large bald eagle perched in a nearby tree overlooking a flourishing trout habitat. After leaving the main hatchery the students ventured to the hatchery extension center. They were able to see thirteen-year-old adult trout, completing the cycle from egg to adult.

In the coming weeks the eggs will be arriving at Shaker Road School. The fourth graders are very excited to get started with the new curriculum of trout life cycles and watershed study.
